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Just What The Doctor Ordered

Medication Orders are Part of the Latest Phase of CHOC CPOE

Virtually any computer is now a potential workstation for you. With privacy-protected software and a password, you may write any kind of order from your office, home or, of course, at CHOC.

It really is that easy, says James Cappon, M.D., medical director of CHOC Quality and Patient Safety. The newest phase of the CHOC computerized physician order entry (CPOE) system went online in mid-January and represents "a huge step forward" for patient safety.

Ordering medications for children can be inherently risky due to variable age, weight and organ maturity. Recent evidence has shown, however, that CPOE can be expected to reduce medication errors by more than 80 percent, and adverse patient events related to drugs by about 50 percent.

But Dr. Cappon points out that physicians are also reaping substantial benefits because CPOE eliminates the daily paper chase.

"In the electronic world, patient information is always instantly available," Dr. Cappon says. "Computerized order entry has also shortened the overall interval from when the physician does the cognitive thinking about the patient to the actual

delivery of the medication or initiation of a different type of order."

CHOC A "LEAPFROG TOP HOSPITAL"

CHOC was one of 59 hospitals, and only one of nine children's hospitals nationwide, named to the first-ever "Leapfrog Top Hospitals 2006" list, based on a survey of more than 1,200 hospitals.

The Leapfrog Hospital Quality and Safety Survey is a national rating system offering a broad assessment of a hospital's quality and safety based on four categories, including computerized physician order entry. CHOC was one of only four California children's hospitals named to this list.

Richard Mungo, D.D.S., has always been a wonderful friend to children in need.

He wages a daily battle against gummy bears, sugary drinks and other tooth-destroying snacks. Richard Mungo, D.D.S., typically spends his Fridays in the CHOC operating room treating patients whose average age is 18 months. Better parent education and earlier dental care could prevent most of the problems he sees, but Dr. Mungo knows that isn't the entire answer.

Orange County has a shortage of pediatric dentists working with young or handicapped children. One of 11 pediatric dentists on the CHOC medical staff, Dr. Mungo believes one of the reasons for this shortage is the lack of an Orange County dental school. Residents tend to stay in the area in which they trained.

Thanks in great part to Dr. Mungo's efforts, USC dental residents recently began receiving training at CHOC. With funds obtained from state, federal and private sources, the residents will be working in the CHOC two-chair outpatient dental clinic, when completed, as well as in the operating and emergency rooms. The residents are rotating through the various inpatient specialties, working with oncology, hematology, craniofacial and other patient teams on an as-needed basis.

"In order to provide overall comprehensive healthcare, you can't leave out pediatric dentistry," says Dr. Mungo, who has served on the CHOC Oncology Committee. "When patients have cardiac problems, or are receiving chemotherapy or radiation therapy,

it is certainly reflected in the mouth. A patient cannot get a kidney or bone marrow transplant if there are dental diseases."

The USC residents are also gaining hands-on experience at Healthy Smiles of Orange County, the outpatient dental clinic located upstairs from the CHOC Clinic on the campus of the Garden Grove Boys and Girl Club. Specifically targeting the 0–5 age group, Healthy Smiles of Orange County is working with community pediatricians, pediatric dentists and educational institutions to bring dental treatment, education and preventive care to medically underserved children.

MAKING A MARK ON SEVERAL LEVELS

Dr. Mungo completed dental school at Case Western Reserve and his residency at Boston University (Goldman) School of Graduate Dentistry. He served a fellowship at USC/Rancho Los Amigos Hospital in craniofacial anomalies. Dr. Mungo also has a master's degree in medical education from the USC School of Medicine.

From 1978 to 1993, Dr. Mungo was the department chair of pediatric dentistry at Children's Hospital Los Angeles, in association with USC School of Dentistry. He has published papers in areas of cleft palate therapy, conducted original research and published protocols for the use of lasers in dentistry, and published in various areas of hospital dentistry and oral complications of AIDS in the pediatric population.

Dr. Mungo has also served on the board of several dental societies, and is a past-president of the California Society of Pediatric Dentistry, Western Society of Pediatric Dentistry, and the Southern California Chapter of the American Society of Dentistry for Children. He has received several prestigious honors including the Harold McAllister Chair in Dentistry, and the Morris and Mary Press Humanism Award. In 2002 he received the L.I.F.E.

HOAG AFFILIATION ENHANCES PEDIATRIC CARE IN COASTAL ORANGE COUNTY

CHOC and Hoag Memorial Hospital Presbyterian have joined forces to enhance and expand pediatric care and services in the coastal Orange County area. Through a formal affiliation agreement with CHOC, Hoag is expanding its pediatric outpatient services, and creating an expedited system of evaluating and transferring critically ill or injured children and infants to CHOC.

“We are delighted that our long-standing relationship with Hoag has resulted in this new, formal affiliation,” says CHOC President and CEO Kimberly C. Cripe. “It’s important that families in the coastal community receive excellent pediatric medical care by top specialists, and CHOC is proud to partner with Hoag to provide these much-needed pediatric services.”

ROBOTIC TELEMEDICINE LINKS HOAG ECU WITH CHOC

Via robotic telemedicine technology, CHOC critical care specialists are available to assist Hoag emergency medicine physicians on a 24-hour basis in the evaluation and care of pediatric patients in the Hoag Emergency Care Unit (ECU).

“The sooner you begin intervention, the more likely you will have a favorable outcome,” says Dr. Nick Anas, medical director of the CHOC Pediatric Intensive Care Unit. “Now instead of just being able to talk to the Hoag ECU physicians, we can actually observe the child, talk to the parents

and physicians, view vital signs and X-rays, and make treatment recommendations prior to transport.” Additionally, other CHOC pediatric subspecialists are available for remote consults using this robotic telemedicine technology.

The CHOC/Hoag affiliation encompasses three additional key areas:

- **Dedicated CHOC Emergency Pediatric Transport Services** — with a CHOC transport team consisting of a physician, nurse and respiratory therapist.
- **CHOC PSF To Staff, Support Expanded Hoag NICU** — the CHOC PSF neonatologists are now providing 24/7 coverage of the Hoag NICU. Their role is to support

the growing obstetric and perinatal programs at Hoag Women’s Health Services and to manage newborn children with critical illnesses born at Hoag. CHOC will also be providing support and education for the areas that work closely with the newborn services such as respiratory therapy, pharmacy, and dietary and nutrition.

- **New Pediatric Specialty Clinic at Hoag Health Center** — a soon-to-be-developed outpatient facility near the Hoag Hospital campus. UrgiKids, an after-hours pediatric urgent care service currently based in Costa Mesa, will also relocate to this new location.

ORANGE COUNTY SURGEON OFFERS NUSS PROCEDURE

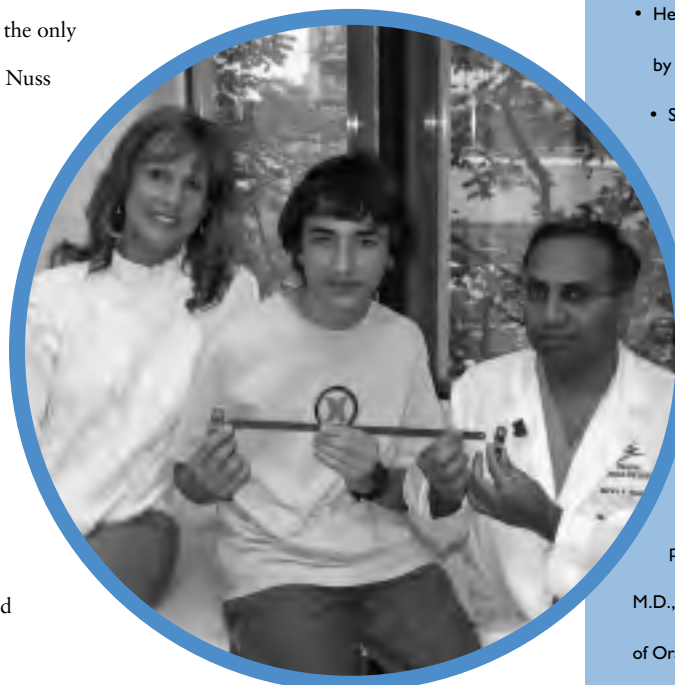
If there is a less-invasive way to perform a procedure, Mustafa Kabeer, M.D., is likely to be doing it. In 2004, he was one of the first surgeons on the West Coast to offer pediatric robotic surgery and also performed the world’s first robotic lung resection.

More recently, Dr. Kabeer has become known as the “go to” surgeon for pectus excavatum. His group in Orange County is the only group of pediatric surgeons performing the minimally invasive Nuss procedure to correct “concave chest.”

“I’m starting to do more Nuss procedures because of its many advantages over the conventional open technique,” Dr. Kabeer says. “I hope to make it a routine procedure.”

The Nuss procedure uses a custom, convex steel bar as an internal brace. The bar is inserted between the heart and sternum with thoracoscopic assistance. Once in place, the bar is flipped outward — instantly repositioning the malleable anterior chest wall outward.

The results are immediate and dramatic. The bones and cartilage reconform to the rod, which is surgically removed two years later.

ABOUT PECTUS EXCAVATUM

Pectus excavatum occurs in about 1 out of every 300 to 400 births with a 3:1 male-to-female ratio.

Dr. Kabeer says the ideal age for the Nuss procedure is between ages 8 and 12 years. He does not recommend it for patients younger than age 6.

He adds that patients with significant pectus excavatum may not always express symptoms and recommends further evaluation of the following signs:

- Localized pain in the ribs or near the back
- Associated scoliosis — this occurs in 15 percent of the patients
- Heart murmur possibly caused by impingement on the heart
- Shortness of breath or asthma symptoms possibly caused by impingement on the lungs
- Psychosocial concerns related to appearance, especially among peers

Effective January 1, 2007, CHOC Health Alliance (CHA) is the first pediatric-only PHC in the CalOptima network. As a result of this change, CHA is serving members age 21 and younger, as well as those older than 21 with qualifying, chronic, CCS-eligible conditions. Adult members have been transferred to other networks.

“With this change, we are better able to focus on our mission of caring for children,” says Kimberly Cripe,

CHOC president and chief executive officer.

“Members will continue to have access to high-quality, comprehensive pediatric care, including top subspecialists at Children’s Hospital of Orange County and CHOC at Mission.”

CPN OFFERING HIGHER CAPITATION RATES

CHOC Physician’s Network (CPN) recently increased their capitation rates to providers. As a California Mutual Benefit Corporation, CPN does not retain earnings, which means all remaining funds from operations are distributed back to providers at the end of the year. This supplemental compensation is in addition to the monthly capitation check.

Dr. Cappon adds that significant medication orders or those of urgent nature are also transmitted verbally to the nursing staff or caregiver, a CHOC policy that will remain in effect to provide the assurance of seamless, expedited care.

THE END OF PAPER MEDICAL CHARTS?

Not quite yet. However, CPOE will eventually replace paper medical charts. The system already incorporates charting notes from several hospital departments, including Nursing, Social Services, Child Life, Pastoral Care, Nutrition and Translation Services.

Customized specifically for CHOC, the CPOE system has been designed with the needs of the medical staff in mind:

- **One-Page Physician Summary View** — with patient information and links to test results.

- **On-Screen Medication Calculator** — for automatic, accurate dosing.
- **Customized “Alert” Screens** — to identify possible allergies, interactions or duplication.
- **More than 100 “Best Practice” Order Sets** — developed collegially by CHOC staff, this includes dietary, laboratory, radiology and respiratory services for several diagnostic categories.

Additionally, several individuals may work in the same chart simultaneously with full HIPAA compliance.

What’s next? The incorporation of physician progress notes into the CPOE system. That’s when those old paper charts will become obsolete. We’re betting you won’t miss them.

Type I Diabetes TrialNet Selects CHOC As “Major Affiliate”

CHOC is one of 15 institutions recently selected as a “major affiliate” of the Type 1 Diabetes TrialNet Network. Since 1996, CHOC has been an affiliate member of the group, which studies the development, prevention and early treatment of type 1 diabetes mellitus. TrialNet receives funding from the National Institutes of Health, Juvenile Diabetes Research Foundation International and American Diabetes Association.

This promotion places CHOC at the international forefront of diabetes research. Currently, CHOC is one of nine sites conducting a study assessing the efficacy of nutritional supplementation during pregnancy and shortly after birth. CHOC researchers are studying whether supplementation alters the immune system and prevents the onset of type 1 diabetes in babies determined to be at high risk because of a family history of the disease.

As close blood relatives face a 10 to 15 times greater risk of developing type 1 diabetes, the results could have profound implications.

“Our goal is to identify the people at highest risk and find out if intervention with early nutrition supplements can alter the role of diabetes later on,” says pediatric endocrinologist Mark Daniels, M.D., who serves as principal investigator for the TrialNet study at CHOC. “CHOC will soon begin another prevention study assessing the efficacy of oral insulin in decreasing the chances of high-risk individuals converting to diabetes.”

Two years ago, CHOC played a key role in the research and care for the very first patient enrolled in

the TrialNet study assessing the use of Mycophenolate mofetil (MMF/CellCept®) and Daclizumab (DAB/Zenapax®) to prevent the progression of diabetes.

“‘Major affiliate’ status will give us resources to identify families at risk for diabetes, and to apply our research and knowledge,” Dr. Daniels says.
